Product Review: PerfectIt

Yesterday I tested PerfectIt, a proofreading software program, by using it on my 400-page book manuscript in Word, which I have read several times. I was interested to see the possible errors PerfectIt could find for me.

I was pleased that the PerfectIt Pro version found many inconsistencies--things it would be hard for me to identify over so many pages, and virtually impossible for Microsoft to find and flag. PerfectIt was especially strong in identifying inconsistencies in my use of hyphens. Although I am quite knowledgeable about using hyphens, my knowledge did not translate into consistency over the entire manuscript. PerfectIt flagged these inconsistencies and more:

pressure-washer/pressure washer (the hyphen is wrong) coworker/co-worker (I prefer the closed-up version) handwritten/hand-written (the hyphen mistakenly appeared once) lay-off/layoff (the hyphen is wrong) first-rate/first rate (the hyphen is correct)

PerfectIt also found a few capitalization inconsistencies; for example tweet/Tweet, Bcc/bcc, and Sales/sales. Although Sales needed to be capitalized as the name of a department, the flag helped me recognize a couple of places where I varied my style.

PerfectIt flagged my contractions too. Although I want to use contractions for a breezy, conversational style, I was surprised to see the hundreds of contractions I used. I found many opportunities to spell out the phrase and come across more emphatically. Because the software flags each contraction separately, I was also able to recognize the number of sentences I began with "It's," as in "It's a good idea to. . . ." That information helped me edit for conciseness.

PerfectIt Pro also identifies inconsistencies in the punctuation of bullet points and lists, words spelled more than one way, numbers rendered differently, unidentified abbreviations and acronyms, and unlabeled tables.

Because of the improved consistency and correctness of my manuscript, I highly recommend PerfectIt for anyone who writes long documents or team-written documents in Word.
